

FORTY-FIFTH REUNION

The Barton Historical Society, Inc. held its forty-fifth Annual Meeting on Sunday, August 12, 1984 at Tyger Baptist Church, Tigerville, South Carolina. The Barton Clan met for Morning Worship with the Tyger Church Congregation at their regular Sunday Services. Rev. S. P. Hester delivered the message.

Lunch and fellowship in the Church social hall was followed by the Family business meeting in the Church auditorium.

The Business Session opened by singing of "Faith of Our Fathers" and then the Call to Order and Welcome by President Bill Stroud. Dianne Gosnell, (her grandfather is a Barton) sang a solo at this time.

The minutes of the forty-fourth reunion were read by Secretary, Joan Little. They were approved as read.

Mrs. Thelma B. Dear Betty,

Saw your name mentioned in Barton Bulletin and wasn't sure whether you were seeking information on Henry Pleasant Barton or just making a statement when you sent in your donation.

Either way, David Jackson Barton was my grandfather and a brother to a Henry Pleasant Barton who married Jerlia Cox in Caynga, Anderson Co. Texas. Names of descendants of your or that lineage are: Dr. Julian C. Barton, 703 Nix Prof. Bldg., San Antonia, Tx 78205, a son of HP & Julia, a bachelor, and Dr. Julian's brother Charles daughter-Julia Martha Brindley, % Dr. Hanes H. Brindley, % Scott & White Clinic, Temple, Tx 76501. Julia also works genealogy, but I haven't contacted her to get

H.P.'s information.

Mrs. Elva Thornton, 209 Guadulope St., Athens, Tx 75751 is another gd of D.J. and has written a pamphlet on the Cayuga Barton's - sell for \$5 and will take you back to H.P.'s father Thomas R. and his gf David in Perry Co. Ala.

I have some Poole info - Thomas R's wife and some Rutherford into - David's wife. We are descendants of Thomas & Bethire (Williamson) Barton who was son of Thomas & Sarah (Wilson) according to Barton Blue Book, p. 8 & p. 15. Be happy to share if you are interested.

It's kinda strange being a Coyugian Barton in the mist of all the BERTRAM Bartons, but our David's brother, Elisha - to Tx by 1830 M's son, Jefferson received bounty land around Marble Falls in Burnet County for fighting in Battle of San Jacinto. Jefferson died before he received the land, but his heirs (brother & sister) came before the Bertram Bartons in 1854. That is year our Thomas R. & family came to Cayuga. Both bunches of Barton's are kin, but you have to go back to Thomas & Sarah (Wilson) Barton for the connection. Another point of interest, another brother of our David, William, to Tx by 1828 was the original owner of Barton Springs in Austin.

I'll not keep rattling on as you likely have all of this. I can fill you in past Henry Pleasant Barton m. Julia Cox, but not up to him. Would appreciate a family sheet on him if you do have one.



BARTON FAMILY HISTORY GIVEN TO LIBRARY

Thanks to Oklahoma City's W. Clyde Barton, another large chunk of American family history was safely stashed away this week for researchers' use in the Oklahoma Historical Society Library.

Barton tells us he presented the library a copy of a two-inchthick notebook, indexed by sections, in which he traces the Bavester Barton family, starting with its appearance on the 1790 U.S. Census in South Carolina.

Fifteen relatives scattered nationwide contributed research on the Bartons, their 11 children and the succeeding generations. He said a library copy should be useful because many Barton descendants settled in the Chickasaw Indian nation and Old Greer and Kiowa counties in territorial days.

Barton's own parents, Mr. & Mrs. John Barton, were among the lucky 13,000 who drew homesteads in the El Reno lottery for the Kiowa-Comanche-Apache land opening in 1901. He was born in 1903 in a half-dugout on their farm near Sterling in Comanche County.

Among the many related lines settling in pre-statehood Oklahoma were ARMOR, BRATEN, BONINE, COUTS, MISENHIMER, MOON, PEARSON and POOL. For possible cousins who want to get in touch, Barton's address is 3604 NW 69, Oklahoma City 73116".





Dear Thelma,

"How to fire up interest in a family reunion, particularly in the 'young' cousins, is a very complex problem with many reunions.

-Self Analysis-

At what age do we become interested in our roots? Who we are? Ancestry? At what age do our ancestors become interesting rather than, "I don!t (didn't) know those people"?

At present I am closing in on my 43rd birthday. When about 37 or so I started asking questions about my grandparents, great-grandparents, etc. I don't recall why I started asking, only that I wondered why I didn't start earlier.

To my amazement, I found frustration around every corner. The lack of pictures, information & human interest stories flabbergast me. It was then that I started to realize how 'our' Barton clan had drifted apart.

For example: My father, Roy (NMI) Barton, b. Dec. 10, 1918 d. Nov. 11, 1946 (plane crash), never saw his grandparents, James F. & Elizabeth Connell Barton. Both passed away in the early '30's. Roy was born & raised 250 miles from his grandparents home! Yet, neither he or his brothers or sisters had ever visited the James F. Barton homestead or grave sites. I still find this hard to believe. They could not even tell me for sure where their grandparents were buried.

One of my aunts remembered her father speaking of his grandfather, but could only recall the name Alex (Alexander (Alex) Madison Barton).

So, you see, I had very little to work on. I didn't know where or how to start.

Then about $4-4\frac{1}{2}$ years ago, my wife, Rita F. CRAIN Barton, started researching her family & took a short course in genealogy at a local college.

With her persuasion I reluctantly went with her one night to the library. I assure you, not expecting much, but lo' and behold — Eureka! Because so many Bartons before me had taken an interest, so much information came easy.

My biggest regret and I can't express it enough is that, I didn't get interested before I did. If only 10 years before. So many cousins have passed on in the past 10 years, some I would have dearly loved to talk to.

If only there were some way to get that message across to the younger cousins. LOOK NOW! ASK QUESTIONS NOW! In 10 years, more cousins will pass on and with them priceless information and any number of human interest stories.

Enough of that and on with the problem (1) One thing that will draw a lot of younger folks is - WATER. Reunions held on lakes nearly always draw large turnouts. (2) An area with amusement parks near by work well. (3) Any area near the reunion for the youngsters to "hang out", yet still be part of the reunions. Tygerville's main attraction I would think would be all its history. (4) The pace of a reunion is important. Example: the gathering & signing in, opening ceremonies, business, all these things are important, but should go as smooth & quickly as possible. (5) Give younger cousins more responsibility. An excellent example is Mr. Frank Barton, Jr.

Of course the hard part & secret to the whole thing is getting them there the first time. Then seeing to it they enjoy themselves enough to WANT to come back.

Having never been to Tygerville, I can't possibly know what problems there might be. From what I read & see in THE BULLETIN, it all looks good to me. Makes me wonder if economics doesn't play a good deal in the problem. Perhaps a bi-

yearly reunion might be more distrable. Whatever the solution, I hope someone comes up with it.

My goodness, I didn't intend for this to be so long, but before closing I would like to add: I am presently toying with an idea of a "Hugh Texas Barton Cousins Round-Up". If any Texas Barton cousins out there 'take a cotton' to this idea, please contact me.

Mr. W.C. Barton, Jr:



"BARTON BLUE BOOK II"

As all of you know, our own MARGARET McCABE who had a profound interest in Genealogy, especially in her Barton Ancestry, was not happy with "Barton Blue Book I" as so many families were incomplete (Cousin Jason could never have produced it had he waited until he had opportunity to complete all lines which would probably have been impossible for anyone to do, so she set out several years ago collecting materials to bring it more up-to-date. She said she intended to call it "Barton Blue Book II".

Some of you have already learned that Margaret died October 18, 1984. In an 8 page letter from her dated September 13, 1984, she said that the carpenter was coming September 26th to start her genealogical office; that she was running off 700 copies of a letter to send out urging more people to send in updated records. WILL OF DAVID BARTON 1777-1848

MRS. GORDON (ELIZABETH BARTON) HAGER, P.O. Box 482, Bourbon, Mo. 65441, has requsted the republication of the will of her ggg grandfather David Barton, b. January 28, 1777, d. November 27, 1848.

It is taken from Cousin Eleanor Barton's Reunion Edition 1975 of the Barton Bulletin, pages 10-13.

"WILL OF DAVID BARTON 1777-1848

I, DAVID BARTON, of the county of Perry and the state of Alabama, being of sound mind and disposing memory, do make, ordain, publish and declare this my last will and testament in the manner and form following, viz: It is my will and desire that after my death by body be decently interred in such manner as my executors shall think fit and proper, and that my funeral expenses be first paid out of my estate. The balance of my estate I dispose of as follows:

1st., I give and bequeath to my beloved wife, Nancy Barton, the following Negro slaves - big Squire, a man; Edy, a woman; Ann, a woman; big Mary, a woman, little Mary, a woman, and her child, Aaron; and Moses, a man. Also all my household and kitchen furniture, plantation tools of every description, wagons and harness, blacksmith tools, also all my stock of every description, consisting of horses, mules, cattle, sheep, hogs and poultry to have and to hold them to her own use and benefit during her natural life.

2nd., I give and bequeath to my daughter, Elizabeth E. Camacke, at the death of my wife the following negro slaves: Edy, a woman; Isaac, a boy, and Aaron, a boy, to be hers and the heirs of her body forever.

3rd., I give to my daughter, Charlotte A. Sanders, viz., Pomp, a negro man, and Jeff, a boy, and a negro woman named Ann, the first two to go into her possession at my death, and the latter to remain in the possession of my wife until her death and all to be the property of my said daughter and the heirs of her body forever.

4th., I give and bequeath to the children of my daughter, Margaret A. Sanders, now deceased, the sum of five dollars each in addition to the one thousand dollars given by me to my said daughter previous to her death.

5th., I give and bequeath to my daughter, Nancy E. Barton, one horse of good quality, saddle and bridle, one bed and furniture, and at the death of my wife a negro woman, called little Mary, to be hers and the heirs of her body forever - also the future increase of negro woman and such furniture as my other daughters have received.

6th., I give and bequeath to my daughter Celia A.M. Barton, one horse of good quality, saddle and bridle, one bed and furniture. Also a negro woman name big Mary, to be given her at the death of my wife, and her future increase and such furniture as my other daughters have received.

7th., I give and bequeath to my son Thomas R. Barton at the death of my wife a negro man named Squire and one half of all my stock of every description, consisting of horses, mules, cattle, sheep, hogs and poultry to be his and the heirs of his body forever.

8th., I give and bequeath to my son Robert W. Barton at the death of my wife a negro man named Moses and one half of all my stock of every description consisting of horses, mules, cattle, sheep, hogs and poultry, also one half of all the plantation tools and blacksmith tools, household and kitchen fur-

niture, the half of which is to go to my son Thomas R. Barton. Also the wagon and harness, to be his and the heirs of his body forever.

9th., It is my will and desire that my wife shall not charge my two single daughters for board as long as they live with her, nor my grandson, John McLaughlin, as long as his father shall permit him to live with her.

10th., I give and devise to my two sons all my real estate at the death of my wife to be divided between them equally, share and share alike, which is to remain in the possession of my wife until her death.

11th., It is my will and desire that my present growing crops, with two negro men named George and Willis be set apart for the payment of the debts which I may owe at the time of my death, and if anything be left after paying the debts of the aforesaid, the residue of said negroes and crops to be equally divided between my two sons and my two single daughters now with me.

12th., I give and bequeath to my grandson, John D. McLaughlin, the following negro slaves, vix.: Fan, Elick, Rachel and Anderson and their future increase to be his an the heirs of his body forever. Also one good horse, saddle and bridle and bed furniture to be held by my executors for his use until he is twenty-one years of age. Then the property shall be delivered to him at his marriage and in the event he should die before the possessing of either of these then the said property as described to be equally divided between my children: Charlotte A. Sanders, Elizabeth E. Camacke, Thomas R. Barton, Robert W. Barton, Nancy C. Barton and Celia A.M. Barton.

13th., It is my will and desire that my two sons, Thomas R. Barton and Robert W. Barton act as my executors to carry out the provisions of this my last will and testament.
