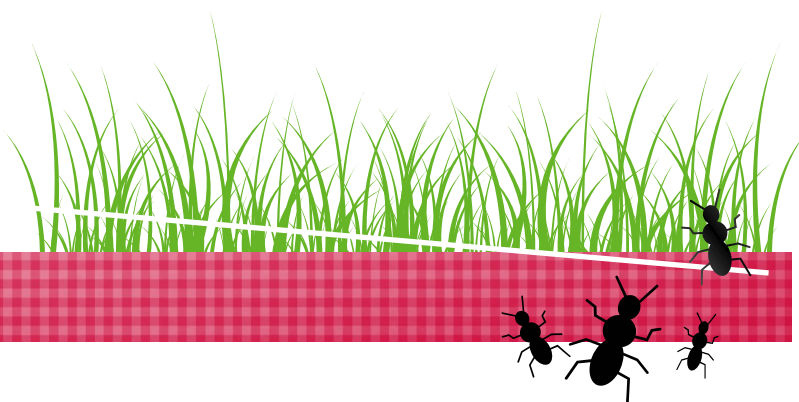

Charles Cullen Barton
Aug. 26, 1927~July 10, 2016

Charles Cullen Barton, 88, of Bertram, left his earthly body on Sunday, July 10, 2016 to be with his Lord and Savior.

A faithful spiritual leader, active public servant, and devoted family man, Charles was a lifetime Bertram resident.

Born Aug. 26, 1927 in Shady Grove, he attended Providence School and graduated a Bertram High School Panther in 1945.

From there he served a two-year tour in the U.S. Navy.

He returned to Bertram where he met and married Mary Nell Norris in 1948.

They were married for over 55 years and raised four daughters. After attending Southwestern University and Tarleton State Teachers College, Charles graduated from Southwest Texas Teachers College with a BS degree and taught school for one year in Briggs.

In 1951 he accepted a commission from President Truman as Postmaster of the Bertram Post Office, a position he held until his retirement in 1994.

Following retirement he and his brother Herman ranched together.

In 2009 he was awarded the 100 Year Texas Family Land Heritage Award for continuous agricultural contribution to the state's economy.

During that time span he served as deacon (and later Deacon Emeritus) of FBC Bertram, Sunday school teacher and choir member.

Charles was a charter member of

the Burnet-Llano County chapter of Gideons, serving until 2014.

He conducted Lay revivals in San Bernardino and Boston.

Charles was a devoted member and steward of the Bertram community.

During the time he was president of the Bertram Development Corporation, he was responsible for establishing and operating the Bertram swimming pool and the Bertram Nursing Home.

He was a 42-year member of the Southern Basketball Officials Association where he called high school and college games throughout the area.

For years, even after his retirement from officiating, he was regarded as one of the fairest and most professional officials in the association.

He coached youth baseball for 13 years, was a member of the Lions Club, Volunteer Fire Chief and served as a member and officer of the Shady Grove Cemetery Association.

Charles was loved and will be missed by his sister, Wilnora Arnold and sister-in-law Arlee Barton; his children, Mary E (Beth) Barton, Barbara Jordan and husband Jack, Charlette Scarborough, and Sarah Damron and husband Alan; eight grandchildren; 10 great-grandchildren; and four great-great grandchildren. He is preceded in death by his parents, Alfred H. and Beulah Inman Barton; brothers Herman Barton and Wayne Alton Barton; brother-in-law James Barto Arnold II, and the love of his life, Mary Nell Barton.

Pallbearers were Loyd Roberts, Cullen Henderson, Jack Jordan,

Robbie Jordan, Matthew Jordan, Justin Scarborough, Stephen Arnold, and Alan Damron. Honorary pallbearers included the Deacons of First Baptist Church Bertram.

2016 Reunion of the Tyger Bartons

The Barton Family Reunion at Tyger Baptist Church, Taylors, South Carolina, was held Sunday the 14th of August 2016. It was our 77th year to get together! Things proved to be fit and flourishing with Kathy Barton Gerwig leading the way. We joined Tyger Church members at 11:00 for the regular morning service, and moved to the Fellowship Hall for lunch, some socializing, and a short business session. "Great food!" said Jim Barton some time later, and he especially remembered that there was a "... memorial tribute, a cemetery status report and a visit to the David Barton home site." After the reunion, current owner Mae Merrill Arms gave an entertaining tour through the BALLENGER/Merrill house that sits on the David and Nancy Barrett Barton home site not far from the church.

A special eulogy was given by Tom Mims in memory of **Thomas Freeman Stroud**, who died June 23 of this year. Freeman was probably around 10 years old when his father, Thomas Spurgeon Stroud, initiated summer evening conversations with neighbors and cousins on the front porch of his home --conversations that recalled and discussed Barton family history and connections. This led to the first Barton Family Reunion at Tyger Baptist Church around 1939.

As an adult Freeman, through the years, with his wife, Doris, became distinguished friends of the Tyger Barton Reunion. Their home was near Tyger Church and they served as a liaison team whenever reunions were being planned. They did more work than anyone else getting everything arranged and ready for the reunion! Both contributed much --and with typical modesty. They wanted no praise, but their efforts were always greatly appreciated!

Tom Mims knew Freeman from childhood and recalled happy memories, describing him as a quiet yet engaging conversationalist, a thoughtful friend, resourceful gardener, and a master craftsman. Many pieces of furniture were handcrafted by Freeman for their home. Even to age 87, through a long illness, he remained the calm, kind and resourceful man that his friends and family loved.

Louisiana Barton

Uncle Oscar Barton was born on 05 January 1901 and married Alice Gertrude Anderson.[References 1910, 1920, 1930 , 1940 U. S. Census for Winn Parish, Louisiana and Find A Grave]. According to the January 3, 1957 edition of *The Winn Parish Enterprise-News American*, Oscar Barton, 56, died on 31 December 1956. He was a native of Sardis, a small community in Winn Parish, but at the time of his death had been living in Olla, a town in Northwest LaSalle Parish for approximately 10 years. He had served as city marshal of Olla and later as a deputy in LaSalle Parish Sherriff's Department for eight years. The cause of his death was ruled a heart attack.

Uncle Oscar had served the town of Winnfield, Winn Parish, as a barber for many years. He was also the City Marshall of Winnfield for several years. According to the obituary in the newspaper cited above, Uncle Oscar was a "member of Eastern Star Masonic Lodge No. 151, Winnfield", and of First Baptist Church of Olla where funeral services were held on New Year's Day 1957 with the pastor, Rev. Mr. Cox, and the Rev. T. T. Edwards officiating. LaSalle Parish deputies and state troopers served as pallbearers. He was buried in Brown Cemetery in Sardis. The Free Masons of the Eastern Star Lodge No 151 of Winnfield conducted Masonic rites at the gravesite.

Oscar Barton descended from Benjamin and Dorcas Barton (Lineage I in our DNA Database)

Oscar Barton was the son of Erby Benjamin (E. B.) Barton who was a lifelong resident of the Sardis Community, born on 18 Sept 1877. He married Mary Elizabeth Shelton on 24 December 1896 in Winn Parish, Louisiana. He died 21 Sept 1949 in Sardis. [References Find A Grave online]

E. B.'s father was Benjamin Franklin Barton, born 27 Oct 1854 in Louisiana, died 15 Aug 1934 in Winn Parish, Louisiana. He married Parilee Porter. [References Find A Grave online]

The father of Benjamin Franklin Barton was George Washington Barton, born 1826 in Jefferson County, Alabama. He married Leah Pickering. George Washington Barton enlisted in the Confederate Army and fought with Gray's 28th Infantry. He apparently died at the battle of Yellow Bayou which was fought in Avoyelles Parish 18 May 1864. {References Historical Data Systems, comp, U. S. George Washington Barton's father was Thomas Barton who was born about 1792 in South Carolina. According to U.S. & International Marriage Records, 1560-1900, he married Sarah, last name unconfirmed in 1822. He died after 1870 in Winn Parish, Louisiana. [References 1850 U.S. Census Noxubee County, MS from Ancestry.com]

Thomas Barton was the son of Benjamin Franklin Barton, Esq. born 16 Feb 1760 in Virginia who married Dorcas Anderson on 24 Sept 1783. Benjamin Franklin Barton died 16 Feb 1816 in Pickens, South Carolina. [References U. S. Barton House

I will leave it someone else to figure out how many special old homes are called “The Barton House”. But, I will share the story of one of those homes with you over the coming Barton Newsletters. When I was a boy, I would ride my bicycle over one and a half miles of dirt roads to visit it – a home I then called “Granny’s House”.

This is the house, as I remember it from childhood. I believe this photo was taken c1974, probably by Aunt Betty Ruth Barton Major the winter my grandmother died.

This “Barton House” is not very old – built in 1909 - by Joseph James Barton—but on the High Plains of Texas, which was settled in the late 1800s – it still gets to be in a museum. Today, it’s the centerpiece of the National Ranching Heritage Center on the Texas Tech University campus in Lubbock, Texas – about 40 miles away from where it was built and where I loved to go as a boy. It is intended to
